

Roses aren't too fussy, but they do have some soil preferences. Grab a handful of your garden soil. Does it feel gritty (sandy), sticky (clay), or somewhere in hetween?

Roses love a well-draining, slightly acidic soil. But don't panic if yours isn't perfect – i've got tricks up my sleeve for every soil type.

Sun Seeker

Take a walk around your garden at different times of day. Roses are sun worshippers, craving at least 6 hours of direct sunlight. Spot those sunny patches – they're prime rose real

Space Matters:

Whether you've got a sprawling country garden or a cozy balcony, there's a rose for you. Measure your available space. Got vertical room? Think climbing roses. Limited ground space? Consider compact varieties or even container







The UK can get pretty blustery. Notice if any areas of your garden are particularly wind-prone. We'll want to either protect roses in these spots or choose tougher varieties.



Water Works

Does your garden have any particularly dry or damp areas? Knowing this helps us place roses where they'll be happiest (and saves you some watering headaches down the line).



Remember, getting to know your garden ian't just about the roses – it's about connecting with your own little slice of nature. So take your time, observe, and maybe even jot down some notes. Your future roses will thank you for it!

Here's what to look for when choosing the perfect potted rose:

1. Healthy Foliage: Seek glossy, green leaves without spots or discoloration

2. Strong Stems: Avoid plants with weak or spindly growth.

3. No Pests: Check for aphids, spider mites, or other unwanted visitors

4. Balanced Shape: The plant should have a good overall form without awkward gaps.

5. Moist Soil: The potting mix should be neither bone-dry nor waterloaged.

Here's what to look for when choosing the perfect potted rose:

- Root Health: Gently remove the plant from its pot. Healthy roots are light in color and fill the pot without being rootbound.
- Buds and Blooms: Some flowers or buds are good, but avoid plants in full bloom as they may struggle to establish.
- Container Size: Larger pots (5-7.5 L) often contain more mature plants that establish quickly.
- Plant Labels: Ensure the rose has clear identification and care instructions.
- Seasonal Timing: While spring and fall are ideal, potgrown roses can be planted almost year-round if well-cared for.

Remember, a quality pot-grown rose

might cost more upfront, but its head start and health make it a worthwhile investment for your sarden















PLANTING AND GROWING

Planting in the Garden:

Alright, green thumbs - it's time to get those roses in the ground (or pot)! I'll walk you through the process step-by-step, whether you're working with a garden bed or container.

1-Choose your spot: Remember, roses love sun!

2-Prepare the soil: Dig a hole twice as wide and deep as the container your rose is in. - Mix in some well-rotted compost or manure.

3-Plant your rose: Carefully remove the rose from its container - Place the rose in the hole. making sure the graft union (the bulgy bit where the stems meet the roots) is just below soil level - Backfill with soil, firming gently,

4-Water well: Give your new rose a good drink to



Your roses are planted - now let's keep them thriving! Proper care ensures beautiful blooms and healthy plants. Here are the key areas to focus on:

Waterina

- Water deeply but infrequently to encourage deep roots
- · Aim for about 2.5cm of water per week Water at the base of the plant to avoid wet leaves



It's versatile and effective: I apply it as a foliar spray on the leaves or I add it directly to the soil at the roots. It's my go-to for promoting healthy growth and vibrant blooms



Feeding

- · Start feeding with either granular or soluble rose fertilizer in spring when new growth
- Use a balanced, slow-release fertilizer every
- 6-8 weeks during the growing season
- frost date
- Stop feeding about 6 weeks before your first



Skip the chemicals! Plant marigolds, invite ladybirds, and watch your roses thrive naturally. It's easy, effective, and eco-friendly. Your garden will thank you!

Prevention is Key:

- Choose disease-resistant varieties from the start.
- Ensure good air circulation by proper spacing and pruning.
- Water at the base of plants, avoiding wet leaves.
 Keep your garden clean remove fallen leaves and debris.

Organic Pest Control Methods:

- Hand-picking: For larger pests like Sawfly, simply pluck them off and drop them into soapy water.
- Water blast: A strong jet of water can dislodge aphids and spider mites.
 Insecticidal soap: Mix I tablespoon of mild washing-up
- liquid (not detergent) with 1 liter of water. Spray on affected areas.

 Neem oil: A natural funcicide and insecticide. Follow
- Neem oil: A natural fungicide and insecticide. Follow package instructions for dilution.
- Companion planting: Grow pest-repelling plants like agric. chives. or marigolds near your roses.
- Diatomaceous earth: Sprinkle this natural powder around your roses to deter crawling insects.

Turn your garden into a haven for helpful bugs:



 Bees: Bees are garden heroes, pollinating flowers and boosting your harvest!



 Lacewings: They eat aphids, mites, and small caterpillars. Plant cosmos and daisies



 Hoverflies: Adults pollinate, larvae eat pests. They love alyssum and mint.

CAPING FOR VOLID POSES

Disease Control:

Spotted leaves got you worried?

No sweat! Let's explore some quick, natural ways to keep your roses healthy and blooming. These simple tricks will have your garden thriving in no time.

Baking soda spray:

 Mix 1 tablespoon baking soda, 1 tablespoon vegetable oil, and 1 teaspoon liquid soap in 4 liters of water. Spray on leaves to prevent fungal diseases.

Milk spray:

Mix 1 part milk to 2 parts water. Spray on leaves to combat powdery mildew.

Pruning:

Remove and destroy any diseased foliage promptly.

Remember, a healthy rose is your best defense. Focus on providing the right growing conditions, and your roses will be better equipped to fend off pests and diseases naturally.



Timing is key:

 Cut roses in the morning or early evening when it's cool.- Choose blooms that are just starting to open for longest vase life.



 Use clean, sharp secateurs.- Cut at a 45-degree angle, about 1cm above an outward-facing leaf.- This encourages new growth and more blooms!



 Strip off lower leaves that would sit below the waterline - Recut stems under water to prevent air bubbles.- Use lukewarm water and flower food for longevity.







ENJOYING YOUR ROSES

Deadheading for Continuous Flowering

Think of deadheading as giving your roses a little motivational pep talk:

Why it matters:

· Removes spent blooms before they form hips (seed pods).- Encourages the plant to produce more flowers.- Keeps your garden looking tidy.

How to deadbead:

· Cut just above the first set of leaves below the spent flower.- For clusters, wait until most blooms are spent, then cut the whole stem back
